## **Styles of Parenting**

- 1. Authoritarian The parents' word is law, not to be questioned, and misconduct is punished. Authoritarian parents seem aloof from their children, showing little affection or nurturance. Maturity demands are high, and parent-child communication is rather low.
- 2. Permissive The parents make few demands on their children, hiding any impatience they feel. Discipline is lax. Parents are nurturant, accepting, and communicate well with offspring. They make few maturity demands because they view themselves as available to help their children but not as responsible for shaping how offspring turn out.
- 3. Authoritative The parents in this category are similar in some ways to authoritarian parents, in that they set limits and enforce rules, but they are also willing to listen receptively to the child's requests and questions. Family rule is more democratic than dictatorial. Parents make high maturity demands on offspring, communicate well with them, and are nurturant.
