Course Description:	IBUS 1341 Global Supply Chain Management (3-0-21). International purchasing or sourcing. Includes the advantages and the barriers of purchasing internationally, global sourcing, procurement technology, and purchasing processes. Emphasizes issues of contract administration, location, and evaluation of foreign suppliers, total cost approach, exchange fluctuations, customs procedures, and related topics. Course Rationale:	The goals and objectives of this course prepare students for (1) the NASBITE Exam, obtaining or improving the understanding of the elements of purchasing, sourcing of materials internationally or supply chain management, (2) achieving job advancement, completing certificate/degree requirements and/or (3) fulfilling personal goals.
Course Learning Outcomes:	Discuss the broad issues of international purchasing and sourcing; complete a project in sourcing specific items; and utilize technical factors such as exchange rates, channels of distribution, or customs regulations to resolve problems.

- Impact of trade agreements
- Terms and conditions of purchase of sales (including INCOTERMS, method of payment, etc.)
- Quality considerations (e.g. ISO9000, industry quality specifications, etc.)

- Security issues
- Packing requirements (i.e. regulatory, preservation of cargo types of containers, packing materials, etc.)
- Insurance and transportation liability regimes
- Logistics resources (e.g. Freight Forwards, 3PL, trade associations, Customs Brokers, Commerce Department, etc.)
