implemented implemented	Membership and visibility on campus has increased from 17 initial members to 31. Each member has a team badge for identification and to increase awareness. The Cypress Safety Committee has: 1. Held monthly safety committee meetings covering topics such as: Food handling safety (resulting in an inspection of the campus cafe) Indoor and outdoor floor safety, slips, trips, and falls (New floor mats and signage on all exterior doors have been installed) Seasonal weather safety Electrical safety Office ergonomics (several work spaces have been modified) Door and finger safety 2. Offered numerous training courses including: Active Shooter Training First Aid/CPR/Blood Borne Pathogens Defensive Driving Prevention of Workplace Violence Distracted Driving -No Texting Severe Weather and Weather Watch training 5. Developed and are utilizing a detailed inspection checklist to use for monthly

How did you decide that these improvements would benefit your unit or what weakness is the unit trying to improve

The personal health and physical safety of all persons on the campus is an ongoing concern for students and staff. The Environmental Health Safety & Insurance Department as well as Campus Police, and the Facilities Department have been instrumental in the successful formation of the Cypress Safety Committee and continue to provide guidance. The Cypress Safety Committee is part of the college Illness and Injury Prevention Program. As employee and student involvement and knowledge has increased, the willingness to report illness, injury, and safety concerns has improved. Increased reporting by staff and students has brought about numerous improvements to the facility as well as opportunities for additional training.

Description of what measures are going to be used to determine if the improvements were successful

Through monthly Safety Committee meetings and inspections, hazards and corrective actions will be identified. Work orders will be created and corrective measures completed within 60 days. Four audits will be conducted next year. Success will also be visible in the form of signage, neater and more organized work spaces, from better functioning emergency notification systems, and from the positive and frequent comments received from students and staff.

baseline data used to determine improvements were needed

Injury and accident logs have not proven to be the best indicator of safety and wellness improvement. The 2011 staff injury log indicated one slip and fall. The Feb-May 2012 staff injury log reflected one pulled muscle. The Jan-Apr 2012 student injury log reflected two cut fingers in a science lab and one slip and fall. As the Safety Committee grows, matures, and becomes more knowledgeable, reporting procedures will continue to improve and topics of concern and interest will be shared and addressed. Trainings and events will continue to be directly related to the comments and discussions from the expanded committee and through participation in the community wellness initiative.
